
We Light Candles on an Advent Wreath

Lesson Steps

Opening Prayer

Pray the Sign of the Cross with the child, followed by: Dear God, during the season of Advent, we get ready for the birth of baby Jesus. Help us prepare for Jesus' birth. Help us be patient. Help us show **love to others. Help others know that Jesus is the Light of the World.** Pray the Sign of the Cross.

Begin with Life Experience

prepare for Jesus' birth. Allow the child to look at and touch a variety of unlit candles and observe a "lit" flameless candle. light) Say: Jesus is the light of the world. We light candles on an Advent wreath to remind us to Invite the child to tell you in words, through signing, or drawing what candles are used for. (to bring

consider making a wreath with fresh greens and flameless candles. repeat this process, adding the "flame" to each candle. If time and availability of resources allow, each candle on the wreath. Point to a purple candle and say: First, we light one purple candle. Say: During Advent, we light candles on an Advent wreath. Help the child color the wreath and Place a drop of glue on the candle's flame and help the child sprinkle glitter onto the glue. Then Help the child cut out each candle and glue it to the Advent wreath. Say: During Advent, we light the candles shown on the photocopy of Side B. Color three candles purple and one candle pink.

Closing Prayer
